# THURSDAY NIGHT SERVICE ON THE MOVE!

Thursday nights have been a blessing in our Church. God has birthed a new ministry that we are preparing to embark on. God calls us to be Doers of his Word, not Just Hearers. We are learning how to approach and share our Faith with our town's homeless population. This was birthed by a message from our newest member, Leah. Leah and her family have been following God's call on their life and has been attending for little over 10 months with us. Leah and Kobi have repeatedly taken items to the homeless camp and most recently after our picnic, gathered up our unused items and fed over a dozen people a good home-cooked meal! Talk about a "Fish and Loaves" moment. I thought it would be appropriate for her to share how the ministry of our blessing bags came about and how God has equipped this endeavor in her own words!

Leah: The wonderful blessing bags we have started making was because of a homeless women in a bad situation. I met her after going out and handing food and water to the homeless after a Sunday service that hit home. Pastor Jeff preached on compassion and the homeless being just one block from where Middletown was revitalizing downtown! I had to leave her, but I went home and prayed! I prayed about it for days, I still do. While in prayer I felt God directing me to make and hand out blessing bags and go back out and help. So all at once everything fit into place. God gave us a way to get everything together to give too many in our community. We were able to find all the items for the bags inexpensively, and the funding fell into place! Even the training to share our faith, God has opened doors! We developed a team comprised of myself, Karen H. Crystal, Kobi and Debbie. With a generous donation from our Outreach Committee and a few other donors within 48 hours we could order everything and more!

in these bags are many little blessings: Dry snacks, a bottle of water, a juice, tissues, Band-Aids, Neosporin, body wipes, feminine items, toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, chap stick, toilet wipes, sanitize wipes, socks, lotion, cross necklace, dry shampoo, face mask, bubble gum and shavers. Also in the bags are the information sheets with helplines and for clean exchange to lower sickness from our friends, Officer Owens and Officer Birch in the police department. There was also a love reminder from our church to remind them they are so loved through Christ and by their family through Christ! Each Day it seems as God brings new opportunities and items to be able to distribute to our cities most needy!


Thank you so much for the support in helping heal the hearts and lives in our community! Excited to see where the blessings go! God is amazing and he will leave the 99 for the 1!

#### **Pulpit Exchange Sunday, September 5th**

Join us Sunday September 5th, as Rev. Rich Luh joins us to bring the word, as Pastor Connor and he exchange pulpits for the day. Rich Luh was born and raised in Buffalo, New York, where he did most of his education. Rich graduated from Lancaster Theological Seminary and served churches in Pa, NY, Illinois and Ohio since 1979. Rich also served close to three years as Pastor and rotating worship leader for almost 3 years.

#### World Communion Sunday, October 3rd

From Global Ministries World Communion Sunday offers congregations a distinctive opportunity to experience Holy Communion in the context of the global community of faith. The first Sunday of October has become a time when Christians in every culture break bread and pour the cup to remember and affirm Christ as the Head of the Church. On that day, they remember that they are part of the whole body of believers. Whether shared in a grand cathedral, a mud hut, outside on a hilltop, in a meetinghouse, or in a storefront, Christians celebrate the communion liturgy in as many ways as there are congregations. World Communion Sunday can be both a profound worship experience and a time for learning more about our wider community of faith.

#### All Saints Sunday, November 7th

From the Christian Church Foundation All Saints Day grew out of the early church's practice of remembering the martyrs of the church. Special days to recognize Saints developed over time. By the late 300s general observance of a day to honor all Saints was in place. In the 400s such a day was often held on the Sunday after Pentecost. By the mid 700s, All Saints Day became connected with November 1. In time All Souls Day was celebrated on November 2 in order to recognize the faithful who had died but did not have the distinctive title, "Saint." With the coming of the Protestant Reformation, many reformers had grown uncomfortable, not so much with All Saints Day but with their perception of the way Saints were venerated. It seemed to many that the Saints were worshipped in place of God. Lutherans and Anglicans held on to the celebration of All Saints Day; seeking to refocus the worship toward God. Early leaders of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) concerned with "restoring the New Testament Church" and with "Bible names for Bible things" would have found little justification for All Saints Day. Only in the past 30 years have Disciples found a place for All Saints Day in congregational life compelled by the opportunity to enhance the ministry of the church. Halloween and All Saints Day have a confused connection. Suffice it to say that the end of October was a special time in pre-Christian religious understanding. Halloween literally is The Evening before All Hollows Day or All Saints Day; the day on which all the Saints are hallowed. In some Christian traditions, a vigil of prayer is conducted on All Hollow's Eve to prepare for All Saints Day. Thus, the Christian who is focused on God can enjoy Halloween's fall fun as an occasion to celebrate that in Christ the "devil" is ultimately defeated.

#### FROM OUR MODERATOR

Dear First Christian Church Friends:

As FCC Moderator, I have been tasked with updating the church Constitution and Bylaws, which haven't been revised since 2011. The FCC Constitutional Review Committee has met on the last four Wednesday's during the month of August. We set a goal of completing the constitution review by Labor Day and we are making a good deal of progress in our review, rewrite, and update of the church's constitution and bylaws.

Some examples of the changes to the constitution, adopted by the committee are: Article II will now be the First Christian Church (DOC) Mission: We are the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) where All are welcome. We are faith based, following the teachings of Jesus Christ, and carrying the word to others by serving our community and beyond. Article V: Section F Cabinet will be deleted from the revised constitution since it no longer meets and duplicates the role of the current FCC board. Article VI: will be revised to read Congregational meeting shall be held annually and at other times as needed. **Article VII will now be Job Descriptions** (new addition) and Article VIII will be Amendments.

The constitutional review committee will continue to meet on Wednesday's starting at 7pm. If you have questions or suggestions about the committee's review, please contact me.

I would like to recognize Pastor Connor on being accepted into the Master of Divinity program at the Lexington Theological Seminary. (He is going to be busy guy for the next six years, we wish him well.)

I want to thank Pastor Jeff for his Modern Service on Thursday's using The Chosen. This has been my first experience in studying the life of Jesus and his ministry. It is very exciting for me and I find myself looking forward to seeing the next episode each week. I also want to congratulate Pastor Jeff on completing the requirements for his commissioning with the Disciples of Christ.

FCC's Scouts BSA Troop 250 attended our service on Sunday July 18<sup>th</sup> prior to their departing for a week at Camp Friedlander, Dan Beard Council, BSA summer camp. #### A MOMENT FOR HISTORY

First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Middletown, is in its 110th year. From now through May 2022, I as the Historian of FCC, will present each month "A Moment for History" of this congregation. The content of these articles will vary from the formation of the church and congregation to special events. These articles will not be a chronological history, but will be highlights from the 1st 110 years.

#### The Beginning of the Church of Christ **Movement and First Christian Church** of Middletown, Ohio

The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) had humble beginnings in a rural area called Cane Ridge, near Paris, Kentucky in 1834. This camp meeting was attended by 50,000 people over several weeks. Two prominent ministers attending the meeting were Barton W. Stone and Alexander Campbell. Stone, a Presbyterian minister from rural Pennsylvania, where there were few churches and fewer preachers, let all kinds of Christians – Methodists, Baptists, Congregationalists and new light Presbyterians take part in the Lord's supper. He said, "I know from the Bible the 'Lord's Supper' belongs to God and not humans". Campbell once said in a sermon "Christians live under grace, not under law, under Christ, not under Moses, under the New Testament, not the Old". In 1834, in what is now West Virginia Campbell's Baptist church was dissolved and those that followed Campbell were known as Disciples of Christ.

Jumping ahead to 1912 – Early in spring, a united religious campaign was held in Middletown, Ohio where 100 of the attendees expressed a preference for the Church of Christ. After several meetings it was decided there was room in the city for a new congregation to serve the 100 and future residents with like belief.

In March and April of that year meetings were held and it was determined 74 people were eligible for membership. The Rev. L. I. Mercer,

from Christian Missionary Society, was called to organize the new Church of Christ. Early services were held every Sunday at either the United Presbyterian Church or the Oakland Presbyterian Church, until such time as the new congregation had a place of their own to hold services.

The United Presbyterian Church was torn down in the last few years but the Oakland Presbyterian Church still stands and appears to be a private residence.

On May 12, 1921 Articles of Incorporation for the Church of Christ in Middletown, Ohio were filed with the Ohio Secretary of State. August 1, 1912 the Rev. C. C. Cowgill was called to serve the congregation. He also obtained employment at the American Rolling Mill Company (ARMCO) in addition to being pastor. On May 31, 1953 the congregation voted to change the name of the church from the Church of Christ to the First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

Recovery from the 2019 Memorial Day tornado outbreak is ongoing. While most families who owned their homes are nearing completion of their repairs, a significant housing gap remains for renters displaced by the storms. In the greater Dayton area, the disaster ministries of the Disciples of Christ and the United Church of Christ have partnered with the Miami Valley Long-Term Recovery Operations Group to support the Tornado Survivors' Pathways to Homeownership Project. The goal of this project is to leverage the skills of volunteers and local nonprofits to transition "nuisance" properties and vacant lots to affordable, single-family housing options for tornado survivors, stabilizing both families and the community.

and the Heartlands Conference are
collaborating to receive volunteer build
teams willing to serve 3+ days, with an
anticipated start date of mid-October.
